Guiding questions.

- How do you interpret "Experience is a source and criterion of theology for United Methodists"?
- How have your experiences influenced your understanding of Scripture?
- How have your experiences influenced your understanding of God?
- How can interpretating the Bible be difficult if you remove context?
- How do you understand your experience of God to be an individual experience or a collective experience?
- How do you make sense of experiences that challenge our current understanding of God?
- How do you make sense of individual experiences that are vastly different than your own?
- What are some benefits to being in theological conversations with people who are different than you are?



Take action.

• When you are in the midst of an experience that challenges your current understanding of God, pause and ask yourself, "Where can God be found in this experience?" Journal about where you God and, if you're comfortable doing so, talk about your observations with a group of friends.
